One week after we celebrate the birth of Jesus, the "Prince of Peace," on Christmas day, we shift our attention to Mary, Mother of God, "Queen of Peace," on the Solemnity of Mary on January 1st. It seems fitting to begin the new year in honor of Mary for her important role in salvation history and contemplate the two natures of the baby in her womb-the divine nature and human nature of Jesus.

As we contemplate the mother and son, we simply can't ignore the other part of this Holy Family, the human father, Joseph. He has certainly made his presence known at Mary's House. His influence and guidance cannot be ignored especially considering the lack of practical skills a graphic designer and an English professor have to offer on a construction site. Patrick is the foreman and Henny is the engineer in this building circus.

One day we finished a quarter of the ceiling in the guesthouse and had to stop and pull insulation off the wall to apply primer before re-insulating it and covering it with plywood, just so we could remove the plywood when we have enough funds to purchase drywall. Another day Henny and Hannah had to learn how to put together a utility sink in the middle of a field and figure out how to fix the toilet that was recently installed. We've been busy

attending the YouTube school of practical skills and learning what we needed as we go. So far, by God's grace, we've managed to not burn the house down, or kill any of our livestock.

We've also somehow managed to bring our children closer to God. In the last six months, they have become accustomed to nightly prayers and have learned the Rosary, the Hail Holy Queen, St. Michael the Archangel, and











have begun a nightly study of the lives of the saints. But most importantly, they've developed a faith of their own; a faith capable of understanding the deep theological roots of the Catholic Worker movement (the next addition to our homeschool curriculum).

While the humanity in the Holy Family is a daily part of our farm life and it's impossible not to see its impact on our lives, the divine aspect often escapes us until we reconnect with the family that God has placed in front of us, and it's in their expression of divinity that we find the strength to continue with our ministry. Moreover, it is their generous financial contribution that have kept us

afloat during our brief encounter with true poverty.

However, the divine nature of God is best seen in relationships, and its in our extreme need that we can see the hand of God working in our lives and on our land.

During this time of reflection, we would like to thank our family who've been there for us as we embark on this pilgrimage. Our family has been our spiritual and emotional support for this entire journey, has helped purchase the 60-acre Catholic Worker farm, and provided many of the kitchenwares necessary for our future community kitchen. Our family has helped purchase the guesthouse, chickens, and building supplies. Our local

church family at St. William and St. Ann welcomed us into their community, given us our first pair of pigs, offered us hot showers, laundry services, and appliances, prayed for have continuously since we moved to the farm. We are blessed to have been adopted by so many families, just as St. Joseph was adopted by the Holv Family. We've experienced the divinity of Christ through the humanity of the Holy Family and through the holiness of family. Our understanding of the word "family" is growing and expanding to more of what God intended and we look forward to our new family members. We will continue to pray for all of our family, for your needs, for your health, and for your faith journey.
